Message from the Pastor

Dear Church,

Do you recall your baptism? I remember mine. It was Easter Sunday of my sixth-grade year, so probably around 2000(?). I remember putting on a very tight wet suit as I prepared to be immersed in the baptismal pool. I remember wading into the pool, responding affirmatively to the pastor's questions, and then being dunked. However, I remember the problem being that in that very tight wet suit it was hard to bend my knees enough to get under the water. I eventually got there, but it took some maneuvering. How do you remember your baptism?

I would like to use this space this week to briefly speak about baptism, as part of our ongoing conversation/sermon series about our church's heritage as part of the Christian Church (Disciples of Christ). I do not plan on preaching a sermon on baptism, but feel it is important to touch on, nonetheless. The Disciples believe in believer's baptism. Immersing one's whole body in water, only when they have made the conscious decision to be baptized. No one else can make this decision for us. We offer ourselves to God and the community, and we agree to open ourselves to receiving the many gifts of the life of faith.

For instance, taking part in believer's baptism leads one to acknowledge their sins so that they may be forgiven in the act of baptism. Also, believer's baptism acknowledges that a relationship with Jesus Christ is a personal matter and must be entered into freely and willingly. Yet at the same time, when we are baptized the community bears witness, and agrees to bring us into the family of faith, recognizing that we all have a personal relationship with Christ, but we bear witness to Christ's life and love as a community.

To uphold believer's baptism is to recognize that the path and the decisions that lead one to a life of faith in God through Jesus Christ is something that takes some maneuvering, but we eventually get there. Even after our baptism, some maneuvering is still necessary, because the path is never simple or obstacle-free. However, to be baptized is to make a commitment to live our life, as best we can, in a way that strengthens our relationship with Jesus and bears witness to that relationship in the world. When we emerge from the redeeming and sustaining waters, we are making a covenant to live in ways that will redeem and sustain the world, in Jesus' name.
